and leave the porous sheet exposed, so the ink could be forced through to print on paper as it was fed past the rotating cylinder. Thousands of pages could be printed and the stencil stored for later use. Mimeographs became very popular because they were easy to produce, durable, and much cheaper than press printing.


Some of the most intriguing precancels were made on a mimeograph machine. There are 109 mimeograph precancel L-types listed in the PSS Town and Type Catalog (Their type numbers all end with M). Many of these started with the Washington/Franklin series, and they can be found throughout the years, some on stamps as late as the 1970s. Different typewriter fonts and characters have

created some of the unique precancel styles. (Note: mimeograph printing leaves no impression on the paper - direct printing with a typewriter often leaves a visible impression that can be seen on the back of the stamp.)

In addition to the precancel types, mimeographs were also used to apply the user initials and date to comply with the dating order of 1938. The earliest was National Bellas Hess (NBH), a mail order company based in Kansas City. They began using mimeo stencils on their dateds in January 1940, and used several different fonts and patterns for 30 years. Some of the distribution centers for Sears, Roebuck and Company (SRC) started using mimeos in the early 1950s and continued into the 1970s. Because the mimeograph machine is considered a printing process, these controls are listed in the PSS Printed Dated Type Catalog.


Because the stencils were cut by typing, mimeos are subject to all sorts of variations: changing typewriters often meant a different font, and as shown in the examples on page 9 , there are spelling errors and spacing varieties. At least one subject in the Ft. Lauderdale L-2 M stencil had a missing hyphen. Also note the variation in line spacing; that indicates the lines were drawn separately, not with the typewriter.

One of the unique varieties results from the stencil being placed on the printing drum with the wrong side out. The stencil would print as a mirror image of what had been typed. Even today, decades later, unreported dates and varieties can be found. Whether your interest is precancel types or printed controls, mimeos offer lots of opportunities for seemingly infinite variety and new discovery.

# ANOTHER OPTICAL ILLUSION <br> WILMINGTON, SC TYPE 841? <br> Arnold Selengut, PSS 194-4385 

Here is another one of those interesting "optical illusions" like the Dallas Star Bureau I described for The Forum a couple of months ago.

The stamp pictured to the right seems to be an 841 from Wilmington, SC, but when you try to find that town in the Catalog, you won't.

The right upright of the " N " of NC did not print properly, exposing the bottom curve of architect Wright's nose, which makes the top of the " N " look a lot like an "S."


Your eye then compounds the illusion by assuming that it is seeing an " S " because of the curvature of the bottom of the diagonal of the " N " due to poor inking of that feature as well.

The fact that the bottom of the letter is open where the " S " loop should be does not seem to matter.

Have you found one of these optical illusions yet? If so, why don't you tell everyone about it.

## WHICH WAY IS UP? <br> Lynn R Batdorf, PSS \#8048

Precancels have been printed on postage stamps in various orientations. That is, the precancel might follow the stamp design, or be inverted, up, down, or even diagonal.


Taking this into consideration, the question might arise, "Which way should the stamp be oriented in an album?" The correct answer is, "In any manner the collector wishes."

Wishing to give priority to the precancel, my Town and Type stamps are orientated to easily read the precancel. In this manner, the occasional stamp might be inverted or turned sideways.

This question recently arose in an E-Mail exchange with a prominent precancel dealer who commented, "Personally, I mount my stamps in the direction that the design intended. The inverted precancels are mounted with the stamp in the design orientation, so that the precancel is inverted. I see collections occasionally that mount the precancels in the direction the precancel reads, which means that stamps with inverted precancels are mounted with the stamp inverted so that the precancel reads normally.
"In this manner, it is much more obvious that the precancel is inverted (when it is). I tend to concentrate first on the precancel, and next on the stamp that the precancel is on. So, it is easier for me to see if I have an invert if all the stamps are mounted in the design-intended orientation. Then the inverts stand out better."

This sage observation resonated with me. Primarily a general US stamp collector, I mount all US stamps according to their design orientation. Why had I made an exception to this policy for my precancel collection? Unintentionally, I was subordinating the thoughtful design orientation, giving priority to the, at times, capricious precancel orientation. Again, there is no one way to display any stamp or precancel. But for me, I easily realized my stamp orientation was simply and fundamentally flawed.

So, for countless hours, I had the rare and delightful pleasure of examining my entire Town and Type collection to correct the intermittent, errantly orientated stamp. Because my precancels are mounted in Hager Stock Sheets this change was easy to implement. Once completed, it resulted in a nice, subtle, and satisfying improvement to the entire collection. I found this new, more logical, orientation easy to accept, and I'm delighted with the results.

## FOLLOWUP ON DALLAS 242 DLE VARIANT

That is a nice article written by John Williams. I do not have his e-mail or I would respond directly.

One big reason for the gaps is plate damage. Plates were dropped. Things were set on top of them. Missing portions of top, bottom, and end lines are the most common signs of this type of a casualty, of which the Dallas plate is typical. Things also accidently went into the press and damaged the plate.

My favorite example of this is on the plate for the Kansas City, MO Type 205 wp (with period). Apparently a large, full can (of ink?) was set on top of the plate. Perhaps another was then set on top of the first one. The rim of the can damaged the plate permanently. By gathering multiple impressions, I have a partial showing of the rim of the can. Yes, I also have part of the other side of the plate showing the same curved damage that would complete the circle.

An example of this is found with Niagara Falls Type 247. The 25 -cent shows the last "A" in Niagara worn away. The 8 -cent shows it missing. If you found just the 8 -cent you would think you had a real find. But with the 25 -cent you can see how the plate's damage progressed over time.

As both stamps are right end positions, the damage must have been somewhere in the right vertical row of the plate.

*This count is a summary of all five (5) State Groups. Counts will be pulled from the database so reporters need not submit a separate report. However, those reporters who wish to refresh the database to include their latest statistics can submit reports using the normal form anytime up to the deadline shown.

Reports are maintained on the database until refreshed by a new count, or for five years, unless the reporter requests deletion or drops out of the PSS. Established email T \& T Reporters will automatically receive a reporting form a few weeks before the deadline. Other PSS members who would like to participate must request the form and reporting guidelines from the writer via e-mail to arnsel@verizon.net.

Last year we had 48 reporters of South Central Group counts, and now we have decreased by four to 44 . Five former reporters were deleted due to closed albums or failure to report during the 5-year window. Two of these were in the top 20. The five drops were offset by one new reporter. The new reporter is Bill Grady, who e-responded to my request for new reporters in a previous Forum. We welcome our new reporter to the group and hope that he will participate for a long time.

We would like to see increased member participation in these counts. If you are a T \& T Collector, why not join in? It is fun to see your holdings compared to those of your fellow collectors and to monitor your progress as your collection continues to improve. I will be happy to guide your participation if you request being added to the group.

Of the 44 current reporters, 32 submitted a fresh count at some point in 2020. The aging of the rest of the reports is as follows: 2019 (3), 2018 (2), 2017 (4) and 2016 (1). Please check your name and the date of your last report on subsequent pages. Do not let your counts "age out" of the rankings. Although no one is in danger

of being aged out of the report for the near future, if you haven't sent in your status since 2018, you should seriously think about doing so.

The top ten (10) Town collections are all within 8 towns of completion, as they were at the prior report. The top two positions have all of the towns and are tied as they have been for several years. Foster maintains his hold on the $3^{\text {rd }}$ rung. One of the previous $4^{\text {th }}$ place holders has dropped out. As a result Rehkop, who was previously tied for the $4^{\text {th }}$ rung would have been alone there had it not been for the improvement by Adrion from his former tie at the $6^{\text {th }}$ place. Spidle was also formerly tied at the $6^{\text {th }}$ position but is now alone there. Crosby jumps forward from his former tie at the $14^{\text {th }}$ rung to now hold the $7^{\text {th }}$ step on the ladder. The former $8^{\text {th }}$ place holder has dropped out. Patterson and Parker, formerly tied at the $9^{\text {th }}$ rung are joined with Trim, formerly $11^{\text {th }}$, to make a three-way tie for $8^{\text {th }}$. Atkins moves up from her former $12^{\text {th }}$ position into a tie at the $11^{\text {th }}$ position with Masters, formerly $13^{\text {th }}$. Schwartz moves out of his former tie at the $14^{\text {th }}$ position to take the $13^{\text {th }}$ slot. Ross moves out of his tie at the $17^{\text {th }}$ rung to hold the $14^{\text {th }}$ position and Blanford moves up from $16^{\text {th }}$ to $15^{\text {th }}$. Lane is still tied at the $17^{\text {th }}$ position, but now his tie is with Batdorf, who moves into the top 20 from his former $21^{\text {st }}$ slot. Denis moves up one rung from 20 to 19 and Challey, formerly $22^{\text {nd }}$, closes out the top 20.

In the Type rankings, the top three positions are unchanged from last year. The former $4^{\text {th }}$ place holder is no longer reporting. Foster moves up one rung to now hold the $4^{\text {th }}$ spot. Spidle moves up from $7^{\text {th }}$ to overtake Adrion,

who maintains his hold on the $6^{\text {th }}$ rung. Crosby overtakes Parker to jump from $10^{\text {th }}$ to $7^{\text {th }}$. Parker maintains his hold on the $8^{\text {th }}$ rung. Masters improves from $12^{\text {th }}$ to $9^{\text {th }}$, overtaking Adkins, who improved from $11^{\text {th }}$ to $10^{\text {th }}$. Trim moves up from $14^{\text {th }}$ to hold the $11^{\text {th }}$ rung, while Patterson advances from $13^{\text {th }}$ to $12^{\text {th }}$. Batdorf advances several steps from $17^{\text {th }}$ to $13^{\text {th }}$. Challey advances one step from $15^{\text {th }}$ to $14^{\text {th }}$ while Schwartz skips from $18^{\text {th }}$ to now hold the $15^{\text {th }}$ slot. Ross holds firm at position 16 and Noble moves up from $19^{\text {th }}$ to $17^{\text {th }}$. Blanford also rises two positions, Earle comes up from $22^{\text {nd }}$ to grab the $19^{\text {th }}$ step and Schrier advances from $21^{\text {st }}$ to close out the top 20.

The top collection still lacks 12 types, the same as last year. The $10^{\text {th }}$ collection now lacks 283 types, three less than last year.

## LOGANSPORT, IN L-3 HS REVISITED

LOGANSPORT, IN L - 3 HS $(3,23)$ had the (3) added when it was noticed that there was a large "A" in one unknown subject of the device. Recently, I acquired the postal card shown on the next page; there are 4 subjects of the device visible.

This is proof that the "A" was not the only letter with different sizes. There as also a large " N " and " $R$ " while the leg of the " $R$ " is straight on some subjects and curved on others

Upon comparing the card with stamps in my collection, I found some stamps that did not fit any of the above subjects. However, I had a few pairs. By using them for comparison, I concluded the L-3 HS was a six-subject device.

Position 1 has a medium "A," narrow " N ," and a narrow, short-leg "R."


Position 3 has a wide " $A$ " and " $N$ " and an " $R$ " with the leg pointed out.
Position 4 has a medium "A," a narrow " $N$," an "I" spaced away from the "N" in "IND." and a short-leg "R."
Position 5 has a medium "A" and a large "R."
Position 6 has a medium " $A$ " and a short-leg " $R$ " with the leg pointed out.


Logansport was a big railroad city until the 1920's when the city supported a strike by the workers against the Pennsylvania Railroad. The company retaliated by cutting back on its rail hub. The roundhouse was turned into a facility to repair damaged rail cars. It has yet to regain the population it had in the 1920 census. Today it has several small manufacturers and a large packing plant. Many Hispanic workers work at the plant and have made Logansport their home

The card was undoubtedly made in the early 1950 's. Two members of the Logansport stamp club worked at the post office, and the club had annual shows. The two created several interesting post cancel combinations in their work. Most can be dated to the early 1950's. When I first moved to Indiana the club was very active with about 30 attending some meetings. One of the members was in his 90 's and was a Boy Scout Scoutmaster, a position he had since becoming the first scoutmaster in Indiana before Word War 1.

By the mid 1970's membership had dropped, and the club was dissolved. I was its last president.

## PROVISIONAL USE OF POST OFFICE HANDSTAMPS <br> \section*{FOR PRECANCELING}

## Arnold Selengut, PSS 194-4385

While preparing to mount in my album some vintage precancel covers that I had obtained several years ago, I noticed the three presented nearby as Figures $1,2 \& 3$.

These all originated in France during the months of March through November 1910 and all were sent to the same person in Hartford, CT, no doubt by a relative, and possibly Mr. Starr. They were all short paid, so were subject to the double-deficiency penalty then in effect. The postage affixed was deemed to be $3 \phi$ short by the PO clerk at the port of entry, so the NY "opera glass" was stamped on each cover on the front at lower left with the due penalty assessment of 6 cents. Upon arrival in Hartford, that PO Clerk affixed $6 \phi$ worth of 1895 postage dues which were paid for by the addressee. The postage due stamps were precanceled, and this is where the story becomes interesting to both the precancel collector and the postal historian.

For whatever reason, a suitable device designed for precanceling was not available, so the PO clerk used a wide rubber handstamp to precancel the stamps while they were still part of the original pane. His purpose in so doing was to avoid the extra work of having to apply the stamps and then cancel them after they were on the envelope. As was a typical practice at the time, the precanceling was probably done sometime before the need arose, so that the already precanceled stamps were available at his workstation for the clerk to use when he needed them.

The words and partial words on these due stamps are provided in the block under each envelope on the following pages.:

From this data we can reconstruct what the wide office handstamp said. It was "Notify publisher of your correct address".

The use of a long handstamp like this enabled the clerk to quickly precancel a large number of stamps still in their pane with a minimum number of strikes. This was apparently considered an expedient substitute for not having an appropriate precancel device (if one was even available in the office at that time) or using the more usual pen $\&$ ink or crayon approach.

Note that each of these covers has a correspondence number written on the front. The first one has 53 , the second 81 and the third 99 . The span of time covered by the three covers is 9 months, give or take a week. Mr. Starr was writing to his wife at least once per week and sometimes twice. There should be many more examples of this correspondence out there, probably having the same or similar provisionally precanceled due stamps. Keep your eyes open!

## WASHINGTON NOTES <br> Jack D. Blanchard, PSS 3427 <br> Washington Catalog Editor

Over the years there have only been a limited number of errors that have occurred on precancel devices. The most obvious of these were committed by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) itself with the OIHO from Cincinnati. The BEP also committed another error from Ventura, Calif. with Ventura below Calif. on one subject. I am familiar with errors from Washington as I only follow this state. Other states probably have similar errors on precancel devices as mentioned below.

There are couple of rubber handstamps errors from Washington of which I am aware. The first is on a Bellingham 413 device which has an " $n$ " for the " $m$ " somewhere on this rubber device. Someone in the Olympia Post Office altered the Olympia L-1 HS and L-2 HS devices after they had been used for a while. The "a" was cut off on this 3 -subject hand stamp. I have strips showing both versions of these 2 types.

The Potomac Electroplate Company of Washington, D.C. made many of the metal hand-electros. The only one I have is the Wash. below Bong on the 729 Bong, Wash device. I am not aware of any other hand electros from Washington with errors. The Postmaster at Fairfield, WA was an amateur printer and at some time he flattened the 734 hand electro, mounted it on a wood block and used the flattened device to precancel stamps. So, if you have a Fairfield 734 that looks printed, it could be.

A few errors, or alterations, occur on 100 -subject electroplates. All of these plates are known as correct, as far as I know. Some liberties have been taken, such as the plate being cut to provide a smaller device. Wenatchee, WA is known to be hand-applied. Spokane 205 was cut by a Sears Roebuck employee to make a few precancels.

When it comes to the vinyl devices, Baumgartner, the manufacturer of most, if not all, of the vinyl devices really dropped the ball. The Littleton, MA. device has the top two subjects of this 841 device with WA instead of MA. Another very visible vinyl error occurs on the Kapowsin 904 device. Subject 7 of the 10 -subject device reads "Akapowsin."

Subject 3 of the Solomon, AZ 841 device reads "Sclomon."
I'm sure other states probably have similar stories.
